GDPR an Introduction

Gorse Hill What is it?

- General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR)
 - Need to be compliant by May 25th
 - Reaches further than previous Data Protection regulations
 - Need to properly handle any personal data on behalf of GHBC
 - Data can only be kept for defined purposes under defined basis
 - All data breaches have to be declared
 - With-in 72 hours
 - People have a right to know what is known about them
 - Correct mistakes
 - To be forgotten

Gorse Hill GDPR Principles

- All personal data must be:
 - dealt with lawfully, fairly and transparently
 - collected and used for specific purposes
 - adequate, relevant and limited
 - accurate and up to date
 - kept no longer than necessary
 - secure
- Lawful means:
 - With consent
 - necessary for performance on contract
 - necessary for compliance with other laws
 - necessary to protect interests of the individual
 - necessary for performance in public interest
 - necessary for legitimate interest of GHBC

What GHBC is doing

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- Reviewing what data is held by the church and where & Updating our Data register
- Reviewing registration forms for activities
- Introducing consent forms for new members and church attendees
- Introducing new procedures explaining our data handling processes
- Ensuring out-of-date data is deleted
- Bringing data back into a more centralised control
 - Ensuring sensitive data is held with-in church systems
 - Activities to email from website
- Training Activity leaders

What it means for us

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- Members have access to personal data
 - Church Members Directory/list
 - Members area of the website
 - Details of people we do business with
 - Details of other's bank & tithe information
 - Tell the deacons when new data is collected
- It is possible that a member wants to know more or even to be forgotten
 - We will need to know where to go to report or delete
- Possible that we will have a data breach
 - Hacked computer, Break-in, Lost phone
 - We need to know what and when ASAP
 - We will need to notify the ICO

Gorse Hill BAPTIST CHURCH Other things to note

- We should also ask children for permission when over 13
 - Children have more protection/rights in GDPR
- Minutes (inc discussion about individuals) are OK under legitimate interest
- Can't ask for consent by email as you need consent to send it
- Can verbally talk about data policy, but stick to the words in the written policies
- Photos of public events can be used
 - 'legitimate interest' to promote ourselves
 - Be careful of exposing ties to the church
- Will need to review our 'new' data policy in the June MM
